in Carroll County Georgia.

John William Stephenson became a farmer, lived and died in CarrolltCounty at age about 70, soldier in Confederate Army and seriously wounded in battle at

Appomattox. Franklin Thomas Stephenson, became a teacher, spent his life as a teacher. Lived and died at Albertville

Alabama. Age about 70 years.

James Madison Stephenson, became a teacher, spent his life in the class-room. Was for some twenty-five year, professor of mathematics at Oxford College Alabama. Late in life he established a home in Carrollton Georgia, where he lived and died. He gave much of his late life in the ministry being a preacher in the Primitive Baptish Church. His age at death was nearly 84 years.

James Madison Stephenson Born October 1842 Died May 1925 - Age 83 Life long student and teacher - Taught mathematics, French, German and Greek, but his element was in the relm of higher mathematics. Married, in 1871 to Eudora Virginia Weaver of DeKalb County Georgia Seven childred were born to this union, viz: James Madison, Graves Franklin, Mell Manley, and George Brown (four boys) and Virginia, Margaret and Tina Dean (three girls) The golden-wedding anniversary, attended by a large family circle, included twenty-two grand-children and three great-grand children. The celebration was hald at his home in 1921.

Mell Manley Stephenson Born April 13th 1880 at Oxford Alabama Married to Daisy Harris at Watkinsville Georgia on December 14th 1905 Four children were born to this union, viz: Mell Manley, Mildred Mary, Julien Harris and James Evans - three boys and one daughter. He attended school at Oxford College Alabama and at age 27 years he entered the University of Georgia Law School. At age 21 years, he was elected Cashier of the Georgia National Bank. He left the bank in 1905 to engage in the Real Estate andd Insurance business. In 1914 (January) he was engaged as a professional Accountant, which business he has followed to this day. During the world war, he was engaged in war work in the capacity of Assistant State Fuel Administrator for the State of Georgia.

(Names given in Paternal Ancestry) She was actively interested in Church work (Baptist) and conducted a Sunday School class up to the time of her death. She maintained a lively interest current events and world happenings, in social and governmental affairs as long as she lived. After the death of her husband (in 1925) she was forced to give up housekeeping in Carrollton. After that time she spent most of her time with her daughter (Mrs Virginia Stephenson Watkins) in Keysville Virginia.
